WAFood5 Survey Results – Jennifer Otten, PhD, UW

- Food Security and Food Assistance in the Wake of COVID-19: 5th survey (2024) of WA households
- WAFOOD project page: <https://foodsystems.uw.edu/cphn/wafood/>
- WAFOOD started in 2020 with a focus on pandemic impacts on food security, food assistance use, economic well-being, and health of Washingtonians.
- From a sample of 5,528 Washington state residents surveyed between August-October 2024:
 - Over half of households experienced food insecurity, and over two thirds of households with children experienced food insecurity.
 - Nearly half of all respondents felt that groceries were hard to afford, especially animal proteins and fresh produce.
 - To cope with price increases, nearly three quarters of food insecure respondents reported restricting the quality and quantity of food.
 - More than half of respondents reported being very concerned about future price increases.
 - More than half of households used food assistance, with the most utilized programs being food banks and pantries, and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP).
 - More than half of food insecure respondents were depressed or anxious, and almost all reported high stress.

 - Q: For the question for how long the food lasted was it because it went bad or because households ran out? Do we know?
 - A: Thanks for the good question. The survey question we asked was: In the last 30 days, thinking about the food (you/your household) got from ____, approximately how much was eaten rather than needing to be discarded (e.g., spoiled, thrown out, composted, put in a garbage disposal, fed to animals or otherwise not eaten by humans)?

- Q: Hi, Jennifer, sorry I may have missed this in the beginning – could you describe the sampling method a little? Are the results considered representative of the state population?
 - A: We used convenience sampling and we also used recontact sampling, meaning anyone who agreed to be recontacted from prior waves. We purposefully oversample low-income households and households using food assistance. So, the sample is not representative but that is by design. It's a feature not a bug, as they say. It allows us to have a large sample of those households using food assistance the most so we can understand their experiences. For comparison, when the national survey gets a representative sample of WA and has 9.5% food insecure that means they only have ~180 people in their sample that re food insecure. Our sample has ~3000+ food insecure participants and 55% using food assistance. Does that help?

- 2025-2027 WSDA Operating Budget
 - Governor Inslee proposed a 2025-2027 Operating Budget in December 2024
 - In January 2025, Governor Ferguson shared his 2025-2027 Budget priorities and OFM directed state agencies to identify and submit operating budget proposals based on those priorities.
 - This month, Governor Ferguson will work with OFM and agencies to finalize details of his reductions proposal and to provide his framework to legislative budget writers.

- CCC federal funding is not tied to the annual budget, but to the Farm Bill, with a new phase coming up. New phase (Year 3 Phase 1) has not been signed by USDA yet and might be on hold.
