Harvest Against Hunger – David Bobanick

- Farm to Food Pantry contracts almost completed, sent out via DocuSign.
 - o Received more applicants than could be funded.

Advocacy Updates – Claire Lane, Aaron Czyzewski

- HR 1 applies massive cuts to Medicaid and SNAP.
 - Cuts SNAP in three ways:
 - Limiting eligibility as of Sept 1st:
 - DSHS estimates 110,000 people will lose eligibility
 - Expands work requirements
 - o 20hr/week year round
 - More documentation requirements
 - Volunteer work counts toward work requirement
 - DSHS is putting together a process to engage community partners.
 - Removes exemptions:
 - Veterans
 - o Homeless
 - Single parents
 - Former foster children
 - Removes waiver for areas with high unemployment rates
 - Underlying formula "Thrifty Food Plan" 5 year re-evaluation/adjustments, also used for TEFAP and summer EBT
 - New data cannot change allocation. 5 year re-evaluation cannot lead to an increase.
 - Affects the purchasing power of TEFAP and SNAP moving forward.
 - Currently, states pay 50% admin costs, 0% food costs
 - Will become states paying 75% admin costs, goes into effect Nov 2026.
 - And payment accuracy rates will impact the state's food costs
 - 6%+ error rate will increase food costs (5-15%)
 - WA's error rate is 6.06% as of July 2025, which would mean \$130M in food costs in addition to \$10s of Millions for the additional 25% in admin costs.
 - Concerns that additional documentation in an effort to reduce error rates will slow process and increase the administrative burden of this program
 - Congress also defunded SNAP-Ed
 - Advocacy is in progress to restore funding in the appropriations process. Please contact Claire with SNAP-Ed stories to share with Patty Murray.
 - Goes into effect Sept 1st
 - Contact Claire with any questions, happy to talk.
- For politicians, it's the interim/recess/district work period.
- Need to start figuring out solutions to bring forward to lawmakers during recess.
 - Please meet with lawmakers.
- September is Hunger Action Month.
 - Let's be active every day in September
- Possible press conference with Governor Ferguson regarding SNAP cuts.
- Rep. Kristine Reeves introduced a statewide food security strategy bill last session.
 - o Interested in hosting stakeholder meetings for input on the bill.

- At Food Lifeline, we're trying to decide on priorities asap (August) to give lawmakers the most time to strategize.
- Statewide food donation work group to make recommendations about best practices for food donations from the retail sector, will be available soon.

- o Is there a good white paper available that sums up all Claire is sharing?
 - Yes, CBP, FRAC has info, will prep a big update for AHNC and prepare something (FRAC link).
- Will DSHS reach out to food banks for volunteer eligibility?
 - Recommend DSHS contact WFC to disseminate information.
- Claire, let us know how Solid Ground could provide support.
- Claire Lane, here are some Washington testimonials about SNAP-Ed, put together by the Association of SNAP Nutrition Education Administrators (ASNNA): https://savesnaped.org/washington-testimonials/
 - This is perfect! I'm working with ASNNA and some WA SNAP Ed advocates on this meeting w/ Patty Murray you all have been amazing!
- These SNAP cuts because of employment status will immediately impact immigrants, homeless people, veterans, caregivers of kids over 14 yrs old, people in areas of high unemployment (especially seasonal workers)
- My reps are asking me for a comprehensive figure that encompasses all of the cuts to WA State around food. LFPA, CCC, TEFAP, SNAP etc. Are any of you aware of who is working on that kind of overall picture?
- One advocacy step you can take: sign on this letter to the MAHA Commission in support of GusNIP (SNAP Match/fruit & veg incentive programs):

- Met with Reps yesterday, who requested a comprehensive picture on the funding cuts.
 Has anyone got that started? When do the cuts go into effect? LFPA, CCC, SNAP, etc.
 - Yes, analysis of the bill is ongoing, the bill is huge and it moved fast. Food Policy Forum of getting metrics together. DSHS is struggling to figure things out but have some numbers
 - That's a great question and I have continued to seek a detailed summary of the impact of CCC, LFPA, and EFAP on hunger relief. Now we have the complicated SNAP cuts to try to summarize.
- o To be clear they did not even read it, I can't imagine how much there is to shift through.
- The former impact organizations, SNAP directly impacts families' benefits.
- Also, for clarity at one point it was estimated that 40-60% of the TEFAP operating funds were included in the BBB thru the SNAP cuts. Do we know if those went through on the final bill and do we know what %?
 - Aaron would know that more than I do I haven't heard about a cut to TEFAP admin but that's definitely in Feeding America's wheelhouse to know those details.
 - I'll check on this. Here is one TEFAP reference I found in the bill analysis: TEFAP

 Emergency Food Assistance (Farm to Food Bank Projects) [Sec. 10603]
 This proposal will extend \$4 million per year in mandatory funding to carry out
 TEFAP Farm to Food Bank Projects for each fiscal year through Fiscal Year 2031.
 Effective Date: No specified effective date; effective upon enactment.

O To add a twist to all these impacts, Congress has simultaneously been going through the "normal" appropriations process - which likely will impact WIC negatively - but it's not clear they will be able to pass a final budget by the end of the federal fiscal year on Sept 30. So there seems to be a real risk of a government shut down before they can get to a final budget for federal fiscal year 2026

- Are you starting to analyze what the impact will be to the emergency management plans across the state now that FEMA is in its current state. How does the cuts to FEMA impact that possibility?
 - No information received on FEMA impacts. Meetings for Agriculture's Emergency Management are scheduled, but haven't received an agenda.
 - We will share these questions with Aaron Coyle, the WSDA Emergency Management person.
- The president had his agency burn tens of millions of pounds of food intended for international relief programs rather than send them to starving people – just saying, I'm not hopeful about presidential declarations for food for food banks.
- Greenacre Fire in Omak about 20 houses destroyed or affected, most uninsured.
 - We are sending food to OCCAC to help with the Omak fires. In addition Rural Resources will be getting there Reserve warehouse items. That load will land late this week or early next week.

- If you haven't received your EFAP Agreement, make sure your EFAP application is complete and all your documentation is in.
- Other budget buckets (not approved yet): Resiliency Grants, Food Rescue Grant Program (formerly WCDGP) anticipate final later in early August and retroactive to July 1, 2025. Misc Agreements (WFC, CH) in-process now.
- Reminder: Please keep your Secretary of State, SAM, and Statewide Vendor information up to date. We are required to use this information in our Agreements (including DBA), even if there are misspellings.

- FFY 2026 Federal Estimates Only: For our planning purposes, we are estimating a reduction in TEFAP funding and food, and possible elimination of CSFP. We do not anticipate renewal of TEFAP R&R or FTFB.
- Things we are hearing on the federal front:
 - We have received no specific guidance from USDA FNS for TEFAP and CSFP regarding recent federal changes.
 - Civil Rights: Removes gender identity as a protected class.
 - Rescinds May 5, 2022 Bostock Policy (may apply to schools only?)
 - Public source: https://www.cacfp.org/2025/07/07/usda-rescinds-guidance-on-interpretation-of-discrimination-based-on-sex/
 - Verification of citizenship for receipt of "public benefits" may not apply to TEFAP and CSEP:
 - <u>Federal Register: Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity</u>
 <u>Reconciliation Act of 1996 (PRWORA): Interpretation of "Federal Public Benefit"</u>
 - Will take anything we receive from USDA to our Attorney General for guidance.
 - 2018 Farm Bill: Currently extended through September 30, 2025. Changes would impact our programs.
- Appreciate those who share what they hear from lawmakers. Please continue, as advocates
 often hear things sooner than formal guidance comes through channels.
