 - Blue Sky Minds supports the growth of equitable, sustainable, and economically thriving food systems in Washington State, emphasizing the Okanogan region, including Okanogan County and the Colville Reservation. We cultivate collaborations in local community food systems by facilitating convenings, sharing resources, and engaging in outreach.
 - Some of Blue Sky Minds' projects include:
 - The facilitation and management of the Okanogan Region Food Council
 - Council includes academia, public health, WSU extension, Colville reservation, conservation district, rancher, and farmers.
 - Considers all the perspectives of the food systems, land the food is grown on, growing, harvesting, processed, manufactured, distribution, infrastructure, food sovereignty, farm stands, restaurants, retail food businesses.

- Hearing demand is up and food supplies are down.
- WSDA has issued an historic amount of funding, recognizing that it is not enough to meet demand.
- Cabinet agency, anticipating a poor revenue forecast in September, will not be authorized to request additional funding from the state legislature.
- We recognize all the pressures for the food, housing, and healthcare safety nets and that you are the front line. Keep us informed on what you're experiencing, so we can use that data to communicate with the Governor and the congressional delegation.

Advocacy Updates – Claire Lane, Aaron Czyzewski

- 10 year budget reconciliation passed (Federal)
- WIC is not an entitlement like school meals and needs to be appropriated each year. Reach out to your congressional office and tell them how important it is to fully fund WIC. The Presidential and House budget does not fully fund WIC but the Senate budget does.
- Brutal budget year. Congress blasted a hole in our state costs.
 - Cuts to SNAP and Medicaid.
 - Focusing on protecting what funding we have. Worried about funding being removed in the second year of the biennium.
 - o New revenue for the biennium being considered.
- These are the final weeks of the August recess.



WCDGP Wrap Up and SFY26 FRGP – Jeff Mathias and Elise Levesque, WSDA FA

Review of WCDGP:

- Procure Washington grown produce, grains, and proteins otherwise at risk of ending up as food waste, to be distributed to Washington hunger relief organizations.
- o Received \$3,151,945 through the Climate Commitment Act
- Awarded 3 agencies to do this work:
 - EastWest Food Rescue
 - Feeding Washington
 - Northwest Harvest
- o 6 month program
- o Food purchasing began in February 2025
- Food purchasing ended on June 30, 2025
- Program will officially end on August 31, 2025
- Snapshot of WCDGP Impact



- WCDGP paved the way for the Food Rescue Grant Program
 - State funded program to continue the food rescue/distribution work of WCDGP
 - \$4M has been awarded to the same three Lead Agencies for SFY26
 - Program similarities:
 - All food must be "at risk of becoming food waste"
 - All food must be produced and distributed in WA
 - 60% or more of funding must be spent on food
 - Program changes:
 - Less reporting requirements for Lead Agencies (not CCA funded)
 - 1 year program period, with option to extend through SFY27
 - Expanded product categories to include dairy

Recap & Upcoming Items - Kim Eads, WSDA FA

- All SFY26 Agreements and Amendments have been issued, except for WFC and Resiliency Grants
- Preparing for Federal Fiscal Year 2026 (FFY26)

- For our internal planning purposes only, we are estimating a reduction in TEFAP funding and food (20-25% estimate); there are still a lot of unknowns
- TEFAP, CSFP are federal Agreements and anticipate sending amendments out in late September for the FFY2026 – starts October 1,2025
- o Confirmed 400% poverty TEFAP eligibility income guidelines will be updated with new data
- Removing TEFAP client intake address collection requirement gathering input from TEFAP Lead
 Agencies on intake forms (this week or next)
- CSFP may continue into FFY26 and be phased out in FFY27
- Focus on reducing reporting and audit requirement working with our legal team to finalize
 - Shift focus to required training as a means to reduce risk
- Federal Civil Rights and Nondiscrimination Statement has been finalized at the federal level, working with legal team on the state nondiscrimination requirements
- Heads-up that we will be doing amendments over the next month for state and federal programs.
- Comments
 - Any concerns or ideas regarding the address rule conflict between EFAP and TEFAP?
 - We'll be clarifying that more as we roll out the form, but address is already not required to be collected for EFAP
 - It would be helpful to have a collection of data requirements in a side by side format for tefap and efap to share with partners.
 - Love that suggestion.
