

NORTHERN GIANT HORNET STAKEHOLDER UPDATE #24.04 – August 28, 2024

REPORT SIGHTINGS

There are no detections yet this year. Northern giant hornets are the world's largest hornet. They are usually 1.5 - 2 inches in length and have a large orange head with prominent eyes and a black and orange/yellow striped abdomen. If you suspect to see a hornet, try to take a picture, and report your sighting to WSDA. Make a report

HELP US TRAP FOR HORNETS

WSDA's hornet team is fully staffed, but it's not too late for you to become a <u>citizen scientist</u>! Trapping began in July and Washington

residents are still welcome to help monitor for northern giant hornets. You can build, hang, log, and monitor a bottle trap to potentially catch a northern giant hornet.

WSDA TRAPPING UPDATE

WSDA is busy checking over 900 traps in northwest Whatcom County. The traps are designed from a style of bottle traps from Japan baited

with rice cooking wine and orange juice. They offer a tasty bit of fuel for the hunting hornets – which then drown in the solution.

Traps are serviced on a weekly basis. Staff remove the trap and pour the contents into a strainer, and sorted to look for northern giant hornet. The trap receives a fresh mix of bait and is rehung until the next service.





UPDATE FROM CANADA

Canada still receives and solicits reports from the public. Luckly, no reports have been northern giant hornet.

YELLOW-LEGGED HORNET UPDATE

In August 2023 a Savannah, GA beekeeper discovered an unusuallooking hornet outside of his apiary and reported it to the Georgia Department of Agriculture (GDA). It was an invasive yellow-legged hornet and the first confirmed detection in the United States. Since then, GDA has found and destroyed 18 nests.

Yellow-legged hornets were also detected in November 2023 in a trap in South Carolina. The first abandoned embryo nest was found in April 2024. The Clemson University Department of Plant Industry destroyed the first secondary nests of the yellow-legged hornet this month. Read more in their latest press release.
